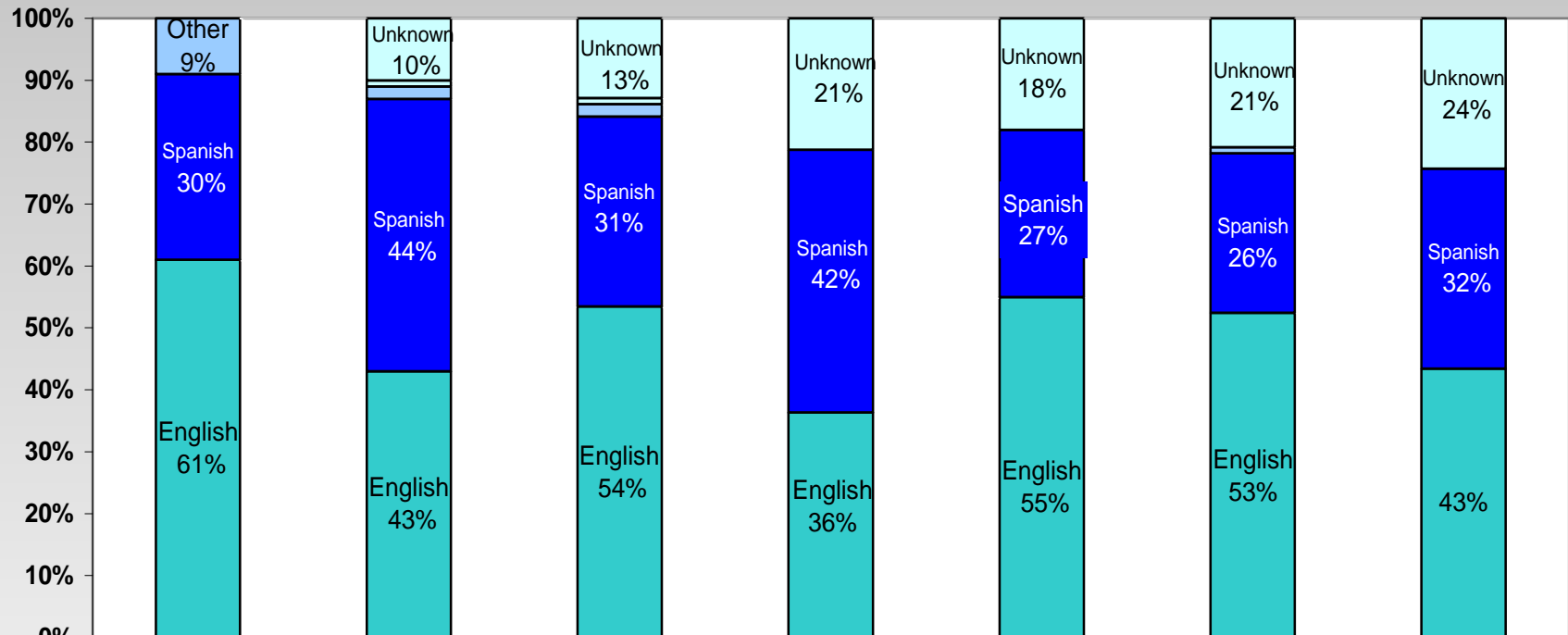

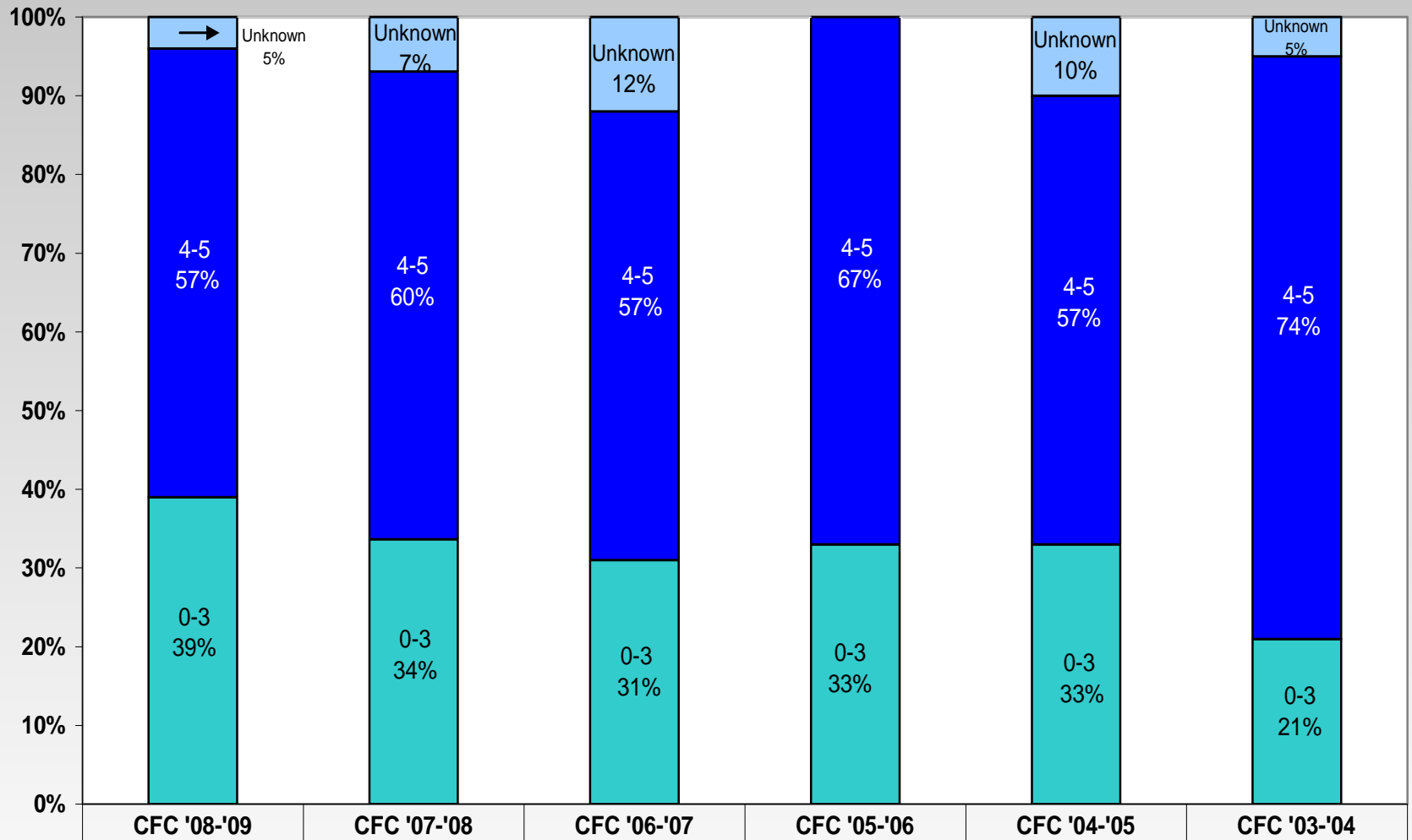

Mental Behavioral Health: Case Management/Support: Resource and Referrals

Family Functioning

- 246 children/youths received services
- 1,652 children/youth and their families
- Case management identified 100 risk factors
- were referred to a Family Resource Center through DR
- 254 youth/youths received case management
- 44% (27) engaged to work on family goals
- Mental Behavioral Health services

Support/Education Services for Countywide Mental/Behavioral Health Child Development

- 99% of children have been enrolled in
Community Based School Readiness
61% of children have been enrolled in
Countywide Mental/Behavioral Health
96% of children have been enrolled in
Support/Education for EL Providers

County-Based Strategies: Community-Based Pregnancy/Infant Support: Community-Based Prenatal/Infant Care Programs

- 90% (92/96) of those managed in pre-natal care women received medical advice and attention
- 65% pregnancy based prenatal care
- 84% in substance abuse education reported
- 75% demonstrated health care knowledge, increased knowledge, prevention and health
- 55% reported behavior changes
- 233 infants delivered – 95% term, 95% above 2500 grams

Support of Activities that: Collaboration/Coordination: Systems of Care/

- Improve collaboration, coordination, and utilization
- 100% of programs report collaboration/coordination
- Increase the number of organizations/assets
- 75% leveraged Prop 40 dollars to receive
- SCOE improved collaboration
- 98% of children in Stanislaus County
- Increase resources Stanislaus County,
as a result of leveraged dollars

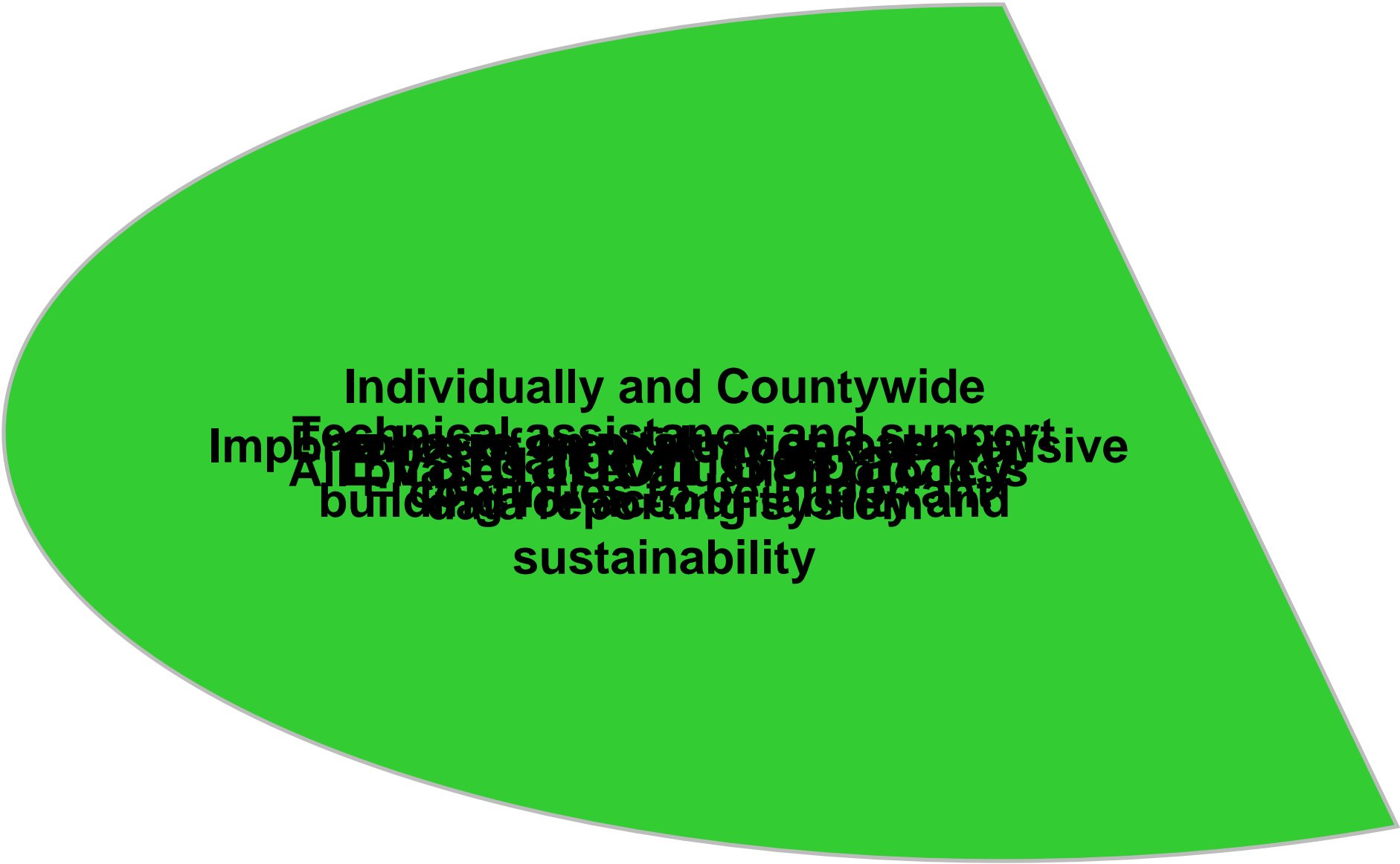
